



Early Years Pupil Premium Report 2017-18

The [early years pupil premium \(EYPP\)](#) is additional funding for early years settings to improve the education they provide for disadvantaged 3- and 4-year-olds. Early years providers are any organisation offering education for children aged under 5, including nurseries and childminders.

Eligibility

Three and four year olds will be eligible for EYPP if the child receives the universal 15 hours entitlement and they meet any of the following criteria:

- Their family gets one of the following:
 - Income Support
 - income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - the guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
 - Child Tax Credit (provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
 - Working Tax Credit run-on, which is paid for 4 weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
 - Universal Credit – For places starting in the summer term of 2018 (on or after 1st April 2018), or any subsequent term, if a parent is entitled to Universal Credit they **must** have an annual net earned income equivalent to and not exceeding £7,400, assessed on up to three of the parent's most recent Universal Credit assessment periods.
 - they are currently being looked after by a local authority in England or Wales
 - they have left care in England or Wales through:
 - an adoption order
 - a special guardianship order
 - a child arrangements order

If a child qualifies for EYPP under more than one set of criteria they will only attract the funding once.

Once the child enters reception, they will no longer be eligible for the EYPP, but may become eligible for the Pupil Premium. Eligibility for EYPP does not lead automatically to eligibility for Pupil Premium when the child starts school.



Financial year 2017-18

EYPP was calculated at a rate of 53p per hour per eligible pupil in 2017-18. This meant that in the financial year 2017-18, providers received just over £300 for each eligible child who takes up the full [570 hours of state-funded early education](#) they are entitled to.

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**In August 2017, the LA wrote to our setting saying that they would no longer provide FSM for nursery aged children unless they have an EHCP. Therefore, some of the children in the setting who are eligible based on financial circumstances no longer have this opportunity. As a setting, we believe in the importance of a nutritional meal and healthy, appropriate snacks and in the benefits of these on a child's education (see <https://www.flickr.com/photos/cabinetoffice/sets/72157647374093145/>). Therefore we were committed to ensure our disadvantaged children receive this through the use of pupil premium funding to pay for FSM.*

Total expenditure is £733.80.

Attendance for children eligible for Early Years Pupil Premium was 79.8% compared with that of the whole nursery population at 86.67%. 66.6% of the pupils eligible for early years pupil premium have complex needs and have PMLD and / or medical and health needs.

We have analysed individual pupil progress based on our assessment of the whole child, recorded in their learning journeys and reports.
